MONTH'S SUPPLY OF HOUSING INVENTORY

AS OF JANUARY 2020



King County had **1.27 months' supply** of inventory (down from 2.34 months' of inventory a year ago)



Snohomish County had **1.24 months' supply** of inventory (down from 2.00 a year ago)

Many industry analysts consider a four-to-six-month level as an indicator of a healthy market.

MEDIAN HOME PRICE

JANUARY 2020



The median price of single-family homes and condos was **\$589,950** in King County and **\$485,000** in Snohomish County.



For single-family homes only, the median price in King County rose 3.36%, from \$610,000 a year ago to **\$630,525**. The median price in Snohomish County rose 12.08%, from \$455,000 to **\$509,950**.

In Seattle, the median single-family home price for January was **\$719,950**, a 1.19% increase from January 2019.

BUILDING PERMITS


The following building permit data is for the Seattle Metro Area (including King, Snohomish, and Pierce counties).

JOBS

Since 2010, the Puget Sound Region has added more than 464,000 jobs. We've added over 2.75 jobs for every housing unit.



The Washington unemployment rate for January 2020 is 3.9% and for Seattle/Bellevue/Everett it is **2.6%**.

Construction employment in Washington decreased by 3,500 between December 2019 and January 2020. Total employment in construction is **224,400 statewide**.
