#### MONTH'S SUPPLY OF HOUSING INVENTORY

AS OF APRIL 2024



King County had **1.3 months' supply** of inventory (down from 1.4 in March 2023)



Snohomish County had **.8 months' supply** of inventory (down from .9 in March 2023)

Many industry analysts consider a four- to six-month level an indicator of a healthy market.

### MEDIAN HOME PRICE

APRIL 2024



The median price of single-family homes and condos was **\$875,000** in King County and **\$738,000** in Snohomish County.




For single-family homes only, the median price in King County increased 12%, from \$875,000 a year ago to **\$980,000**. The median price in Snohomish County increased 4%, from \$767,500 to **\$799,950**.

The Housing Market Index (HMI) was **51** nationally, up 13% year over year.

In the West, the HMI was 47.

### **BUILDING PERMITS**


The following building permit data is for the Seattle Metro Area (including King, Snohomish, and Pierce counties).

1,682 Single-Family Permits (YTD as of March 31, 2024)

1,123 Multifamily Permits (YTD as of March 31, 2024)

YTD % Change Compared to 2023: -2%

## **JOBS**



The Washington unemployment rate for March 2024 is **4.8%**; for Seattle/Bellevue/Everett it is **4.1%**.

Construction employment in Washington **decreased by 7,100** between March 2023 and March 2024. Total employment in construction is **225,400 statewide**.
